The Skills Canada National Competition (SCNC) is the only national, multi-trade and technology competition for students and apprentices in the country.

During SCNC, Canada's best in skilled trades and technologies compete to become the national champion in their respective discipline. By providing a forum where Canadians can compete at the national level, SCNC provides hands-on work experience related to skilled trade and technology careers. This year marked the 25th anniversary of the Skills Canada National Competition! SCNC 2019 was held in Halifax, Nova Scotia, from May 27 to 30, 2019, at the Halifax Exhibition Centre

Here are the SCNC 2019 highlights: The Numbers Tell the Story

- SCNC 2019 was attended by over 7,000 visiting students from the province of Nova Scotia along with stakeholders representing industry, labour, government, education and not-for- profit organizations.
- Visitors had the opportunity to participate in over 50 Try-A-Trade® and Technology Activities giving them a glimpse into skilled trade and technology careers.
- Over 550 student and apprentice competitors from across Canada participated in 40 plus skilled trade and technology competitions.

- More than 150 partners/sponsors and in-kind suppliers contributed towards and provided support to this event.
- Over 50 exhibitors in the "Career Zone" where industry and educational partners demonstrated their brand, trade or occupation through interactive activities.
- Over 4 million dollars' worth of inkind contributions for material and equipment used for the 44 skilled trade and technology competitions.
- The economic impact of SCNC Halifax 2019 on the province of Nova Scotia was over 2.5 million dollars.
- The nine Essential Skills were highlighted throughout SCNC, with a

- special emphasis on *Continuous Learning*. Students and guests engaged in hands-on challenges, presentations, and interactive activities intended to increase their awareness of the Essential Skills.
- Several industry celebrities were onsite to spread awareness of careers in skilled trades and technologies including: HGTV's Kate Campbell and Sebastian Clovis and Andy Hay, local Nova Scotia celebrity chef.
- The official event hashtag #SCNC2019 was used on SCC's social media channels including Facebook, Twitter and Instagram. There was a total reach of 4,000,000 impressions across all platforms which included over 800 posts.



During NSTTW organizations from across Canada get involved with SCC to promote skilled trade and technology careers to youth, parents and the public. NSTTW took place from November 3 to 10, 2019 across Canada.

 official launch of the 15th National
 Skilled Trade and Technology Week
 (NSTTW) on November 5, at BCIT,

- Special guests included: Karen Creditor, President, Skills/ Compétences Canada; Farnaz Riahi, Chief Financial Officer, Industry Training Authority; Wayne Hand, Dean, School of Construction and the Environment, British Columbia Institute of Technology; Jack Dupuis, Silver Medalist in Heavy Vehicle Technology and Canada's Best of Nation at WorldSkills Kazan 2019 and Clarissa Roque, Medallion of Excellence Recipient in Pâtisserie and Confectionery at WorldSkills Kazan 2019.
- NSTTW was officially launched with a challenge called Who Turned Out the Lights?, where the participants competed in a ConsuLab lighting board challenge.

Team Canada Brings Home Silver at WorldSkills Kazan 2019



The WorldSkills Competition is the largest and most influential skills competition in the world and represents the best of international excellence in skilled trades and technologies.

Every two years, young competitors from around the globe gather at the WorldSkills Competition, with the goal of earning the title of world champion in their Skill Area. These competitors represent the best of their peers and have earned a spot on their country's team through dedication and hard work. At the WorldSkills Competition, competitors participate in simulated real work challenges, and are judged against international quality standards.

WorldSkills Kazan 2019 took place August 22 to 27 at the Kazan EXPO International Exhibition Centre and welcomed approximately 250,000 visitors. The event included more than 1,300 competitors from over 60 Member countries and regions from around the globe who competed in over 50 Skill Areas representing the following six sectors: Construction and Building Technology, Creative Arts and Fashion, Information and Communication Technology, Manufacturing and Engineering Technology, Social and Personal Services and Transportation and Logistics.

This was Canada's 15th participation in a WorldSkills Competition. WorldSkills Team Canada 2019 was comprised of 32 young skills champions from across the country, made up of 25 males and seven females, ranging in age from 18 to 24. This talented group participated in 29 of the 56 Skill Areas. WorldSkills Team Canada 2019 was awarded 1 Silver Medal and 14 Medallions of Excellence at the 45th WorldSkills Competition. Canada's Best of Nation Award was presented to Jack Dupuis, the silver medal winner, from Val-Alain, Québec for his performance in Heavy Vehicle Maintenance.

Essential Skills Highlights



The Government of Canada and other national and international agencies have identified and validated nine key Essential Skills for the workplace. Essential Skills are the skills that people need for work, learning and life. They provide the foundation for learning all other skills. These skills are used in nearly every job and at different levels of complexity and they enable people to evolve with their jobs and adapt to workplace change. Skills/Compétences Canada (SCC) highlights these nine Essentials Skills (ES) and their importance in their programs and activities. In 2019, the Essential Skill theme was *Continuous Learning*.

Skills Canada National Competition 2019 – ES Highlights

Essential Skills Youth Assembly – Sponsored by RBC Future Launch

The Essential Skills Youth Assembly (ESYA), comprised of 11 Skills/ Compétences Canada alumni from across Canada, came together to share their experiences and innovative ideas. Participants focused on **Building Relationships with**

on Building Relationships with Essentials Skills: Preparing for the Skilled Trades of the Future.

The 2019 ESYA participants worked as a group to research and discuss changes we can expect to see in the skilled trades and how it affects professional relationship building, all within the scope of the Essential Skills. In addition, participants were challenged to come up with innovative ideas on how future industry workers can adapt and thrive in an ever-evolving job market. ESYA participants also attended onsite meetings and networking

events with partners and National Alumni Committee members.

Essential Skills Forum – Sponsored by the Nova Scotia Apprenticeship Agency

The fifth annual Essential Skills
Forum was hosted by Skills/
Compétences Canada and was
sponsored by the Nova Scotia
Apprenticeship Agency (NSAA). This
half-day event was well attended
by approximately 140 industry
partners, educators, government
representatives, Skills Canada
alumni and apprentices, who
focused on the Essential Skills and
Apprenticeship Success.

Essential Skills Talks – In Partnership with Futureworx

The 2019 Essential Skills Talks was well represented by a variety of interesting and engaging panelists from industry, education and government, including celebrity guests and Skills Canada Alumni. Over the two days of competition,

SCC hosted six panel discussions. These individuals were brought together to discuss the importance of Essential Skills in their respective sectors with a focus on how *Continuous Learning* is important and used in the workplace and in our daily lives.

Essential Skills Stage

The Essential Skills Stage showcased several interactive demonstrations from a variety of skilled trade and technology occupations, while emphasizing the importance of Essential Skills and integrating the *Continuous Learning* theme, one of the nine Essential Skills. The demonstrations were hosted by SCNC sponsors, industry celebrities and educational partners.

Essential Skills Passport

School groups from Halifax and surrounding areas were provided with the Essential Skills passport upon arrival at SCNC. They had the opportunity to participate in over 50 Try-A-Trade® and Technology activities that exposed them to a





wide variety of skilled trade and technology careers. Students had to correctly answer questions in their passport about the Essential Skills tie-in to these activities and about the Essential Skills School Engagement Sponsor; Department of Education and Early Childhood Development (EECD).

National Skilled Trade and Technology Week 2019

The Essential Skills were featured at the official launch of National Skilled Trade and Technology Week at the British Columbia Institute of Technology (BCIT), in Vancouver. Document Use, NSTTW's ES theme, was highlighted throughout the event. The Essential Skills booth

encouraged hands on practice of the ES Mobile App and featured take away modules of the ES Work Ready Youth Program for teachers. Visiting students followed an Essential Skills passport which took them to a variety of partner sponsored booths to test out their skills. This allowed her to advance to the 2008 Skills Canada National Competition (SCNC), in Calgary, where she won the gold medal, which qualified her to compete at the 40th WorldSkills Competition. At WorldSkills Calgary 2009, she took home a Medallion of Excellence in her Skill Area. Her competition achievements helped her to further pursue her career in technology with increased confidence and selfesteem. "I've connected with so many supportive and talented people along the way, many of whom I now call friends (and practically family). I really don't think I'd be where I am today if I hadn't had those experiences", said Stacy.

Stacy has remained involved with Skills over the years in many ways. At WorldSkills São Paulo 2015, she competed in the WorldSkills Digital Challenge; she was also an ambassador at the 2016 WorldSkills General Assembly, in Niagara Falls; and she has been a key volunteer at the Skills Canada National Competitions since 2010.

In addition, Stacy has also mentored high school students, participated as a judge at the Skills Canada Ontario cardboard boat races, and spoken at partner and alumni events. She continues to promote Skills Canada within her community, and encourages youth to participate in their many programs.

"Staying involved with Skills Canada over the years has given me the opportunity to spread the love for their programs and to encourage those who want to pursue a career in technology.
