National Skilled Trade and Technology Week (NSTTW)

I recently attended the interactive event for NSTTW, at Campus Regina Public, which was hosted by Skills/Compétences Canada. It was incredible to see all the students getting excited about the skilled trades and technologies. It was also a great experience that allowed me to share my skills journey and connect with our future workforce.

How it all began

Skilled trades and technologies have played a huge role in shaping my career, especially through the Skills Competitions. I first got into design when I was 12, playing around with Photoshop, and making things for my YouTube channel. It was just for fun at first, but that changed in eighth grade when my teacher asked me to design a logo for a class charity project. That's when I realized how much I loved it and started to take design more seriously. In high school, I took a communication media course, where I learned about video production, animation, photography, and design. That's when I started thinking, 'Maybe this could be a real career.'

The impact of Skills Competitions

After high school, I enrolled at Saskatchewan Polytechnic in their Graphic Design program. Following this, I was encouraged to join a bootcamp for Skills Competitions. I didn't think I was good enough at first, but my teachers saw potential in me and explained to me how far Skills could take me — to provincial, national, and even international competitions. I kept practicing, doing the eight-hour long

bootcamps, and I placed second in the Provincial Skills Competition. I went on to compete at the Skills Canada National Competition 2023, in Winnipeg and won the gold medal! That win opened the door for me to compete at the WorldSkills Competition 2024, in Lyon, France, last September. Competing at that level gave me so much more than just technical skills, it



gave me an experience I couldn't get anywhere else, even in the industry. The challenges I experienced and the high expectations that I had for myself pushed me to become a better designer, and I'm really grateful for that.

The value of skilled trades and technologies

That's why I believe the Skills Competitions, and skilled trades and technologies are so important. They open up a world of opportunities and experiences for young people that you just can't find anywhere else. Getting involved in skilled trades lets youth tap into their creativity, learn practical skills, and gain real-world experience that can really make a difference in their lives. Skilled trades and technologies are not just options—they're fulfilling career paths. When young people dive into these opportunities, they not only empower themselves but also make meaningful contributions to our society.

Why does it happen?



- Skills/Compétences Canada (SCC), hosted an event for the 20th National Skilled Trade and Technology Week (NSTTW) on Thursday, November 7, at Campus Regina Public, in Regina, Saskatchewan.
- The event included welcome messages from Knowledge Keeper Gary Gott from Sapotaweyak Cree Nation, Manitoba Treaty 4 Territory, who welcomed everyone to the land, Christina Hagberg, Director of Operations from SCC, Lawrence Somers and Kendra **Beliveau, Principal and Vice-Principal** from Campus Regina Public, and Clyde Abanid, WorldSkills Team Canada 2024 competitor in Graphic Design Technology. In addition, Arianna Dyck, Welder and Rodeo Queen from White City, Saskatchewan engaged with the student visitors and shared her career journey into the skilled trades.
- Highlighted at the event was the importance of Writing, one of the Skills for Success identified as fundamental to working in the skilled trade and technology industries.

- The networking breakfast, held in conjunction with the event, had about 100 guests with representatives from education and industry, and SCC alumni.
- Skills/Compétences Canada announced that the Skills Canada National Competition 2025 will be hosted in Regina, Saskatchewan, on May 29 and 30, at the Regina Exhibition Association Limited (REAL) District.
- Following the official program, over 600 registered students from local and middle high schools participated in 30 Try-A-Trade[®] and Technology activities held by educators and industry experts. These activities ranged from video game design, cosmetology, welding, to automotive technology, just to name a few. Throughout the day, students learned about the interesting and important educational pathways and career opportunities in several trade and technology sectors. In addition, the students had a skills passport which they could get stamped after completing the various Try-A-Trade[®] and Technology activities, for the chance to win a prize.

Spotlight on Writing, one of the Skills for Success

During National Skilled Trade and Technology Week and for the next year, Skills/Compétences Canada (SCC) will be highlighting Writing, one of the nine plus one Skills for Success, and its importance to succeed in the workforce. The Skills for Success provide the foundation for learning all other skills and enable people to evolve with their jobs and adapt to workplace change. This Skill for Success was emphasized throughout the week, and during the interactive event, in all of SCC's partner activities.

Writing refers to the ability to share information using written words, symbols, and images. This can include filling out forms and applications, or writing emails, reports, and social media posts. We write to communicate ideas and information to others. It fosters critical thinking and serves as a powerful tool of expression, connection, and influence. Through writing, we can communicate complex ideas and share knowledge across generations.



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








SCC Engaged Youth on Social Media During NSTTW 2024



In addition, Skills/Compétences Canada (SCC) held a digital campaign on their social media channels, which reached **787,512 people**. The campaign extended to YouTube which had a reach of 643,503 impressions and web display with 503,007. The total combined reach was 1,934,022 impressions.

Skills Canada visits Parliament Hill

Dr. Patrick Rouble, President of Skills/ Compétences Canada (SCC), Ray Massey, Vice-President of SCC, Shaun Thorson, Chief Executive Officer of SCC, along with two skills champions met with The Honourable Steven MacKinnon, Minister of Labour and Seniors, and Irek Kusmierczyk, Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Employment, Workforce Development and Official Languages, for a Special Liberal Labour Caucus.

Following this, the Skills Alumni had the opportunity to meet with the Members of Parliament from their Riding including Blaine Calkins, Red Deer-Lacombe, AB, and Lianne Rood, Lambton-Kent-Middlesex, ON to share their skills stories. In addition, they spoke with Shelby Kramp-Neuman, Shadow Minister for Women, Gender Equality and Youth, and Ben Martin, Chief of Staff to Conservative Shadow Minister for Labour. Furthermore, Senator Don Plett, Leader of the Opposition in the Senate and a strong supporter of the trades and construction industry, offered them a tour of the Senate.

During this Skills on the Hill event, they celebrated the 20th National Skilled Trade and Technology Week. The two skills champions included WorldSkills Team Canada 2024 competitors Paxton Coghlin, in Mechatronics, from Ilderton, Ontario and Ben Rainforth, in Welding, from Lacombe, Alberta, who shared their inspiring skills journeys. In addition, the competitors were congratulated for their incredible

accomplishments.
