#CREATINGPOSSIBILITIES THROUGH THE SKILLS CANADA NATIONAL COMPETITION

- The Skills Canada National Competition (SCNC) is the only national, multi-trade and technology competition for students and apprentices in the country. During SCNC Canada's best in skilled trades and technologies compete to become the national champion in their respective discipline.
- This year, SCNC was held at the Centre de foires d'ExpoCité, in Québec City, on May 30 and 31, 2024. This included more than 500 competitors from all regions of Canada who participated in 45 skilled trade and technology competitions. - The Skills Canada National Competition 2024, in Québec City, was attended by about 6,000 visiting students from the province of Québec along with stakeholders representing industry, labour, government, education and not-for-profit organizations. Visitors had the opportunity to participate in over 50 Try-A-Trade® and Technology activities, which provided hands-on experience, and showed them what skilled trade and technology careers are all about.

- Through these competitions and Try-A-Trade® and Technology activities, Skills/Compétences Canada (SCC) engages Canadian youth, including equity denied groups such as 2SLGBTQIA+, women, newcomers, First Nations, Inuit and Métis, persons with disabilities, and visible minorities, and promotes skilled trade and technology careers as a rewarding option.
- At SCNC 2024, Reading, one of the nine Skills for Success, was highlighted throughout the event.
- This year, SCC also hosted a Skills Showcase
 Featuring First Nations, Inuit, and Métis Skills, and
 an Empowering Women in Trades initiative to show
 young women the incredible careers that are available
 in the skilled trades.
- SCC live streamed the opening and closing ceremonies, and the two days of competition.
- Through the Skills Canada National Competition, we are #CreatingPossibilities for youth, our future skilled workforce.

STUDENTS PARTICIPATE IN INTERACTIVE SKILLED TRADE AND TECHNOLOGY ACTIVITIES

Student visitors had the opportunity to experience over 50 Try-A-Trade® and Technology activities at the Skills Canada National Competition 2024, in Québec.

Some popular ones included:

Stanley Black + Decker Canada: Visiting students tried out a spinning laser on a tripod and built a small fake wall to show the laser and how it can help. They also participated in a tic tac toe game where they ratcheted a bolt and then used a torque wrench to apply a specific torque.

Home Hardware Stores Limited: Students tried out their painting skills using BeautiTone paint to create a community mural.

RBC: Visitors checked out the RBC community truck for a one-on-one practice interview with students.

L'Oréal: Students tried out their most popular products and also received personalized advice from experts to find the products best suited to them.

Volvo Construction Equipment: Visitors had the opportunity to virtually operate a 40-ton haul truck inside a fast-paced quarry. They navigated narrow roads and steep inclines, hauling rock from the pit to the crusher, while keeping safety top of mind. They also competed to see who could be the best driver with the shortest cycle time.

Sirco Machinery: Students checked out the CNC Machining competition booth and keyed in their names with the help of technicians using a Haas Mini Mill. They hit the cycle start button to produce a personalized Haas F1 key fob on the machine, which they could bring home.

UA Canada: Visitors had the opportunity to interact with piping professionals and experience interactive activities including simulated welding opportunities and pipe joining methods such as soldering copper.

Canadian Armed Forces: Students checked out various naval and aerial engines with welding stations, sewing stations, TVs with promotional videos, and a sandbag lifting station as well as a large nomadic wall.

Ordinateurs pour les écoles du Québec (OPEQ):

Visitors participated in OPEQ's activity which was offered by their technicians. This allowed youth to discover and manipulate different components that constitute a desktop or a laptop.

Festo Didactic: Students played the classic arcade game "The Claw". With the latest handling technology from Festo, this game has been reinvented. Using the classic control system, there were no tokens required to position the Festo XY axis and close the adaptive gripper fingers around the prize of their choice.

Schneider Electric Canada Inc.: Visiting students had the chance to check out a cobot robotic arm!

For the third year, Skills/Compétences Canada (SCC) gave a special award in honour of John Oates, the former President of SCC who sadly passed away in 2021. The John Oates memorial award is given annually at SCNC. The award recipient must demonstrate the kind of volunteer contribution exemplified by John. This prestigious award was presented by Sue Lefort, Vice-President of SCC's National Board of Directors and previous recipient of this award, and given to

She has also been a volunteer of Skills/Compétences Canada for 26 years as an expert in her field, and has been involved with WorldSkills since 1999. RELIVE THE SCNC EXCITEMENT BY CHECKING OUT THE LIVE STREAM!

This year, Skills/Compétences Canada (SCC) live streamed the Skills Canada National Competition (SCNC), and the opening and closing ceremonies for the third year in a row. This live stream included dynamic event coverage with three bilingual broadcast hosts. The live stream included competition footage from 19 competitions and over 50 onsite interviews with partners, government representatives, policymakers, alumni, competitors, industry celebrity Cynthia Gauthier, members of the National Technical Committee and the National Board of Directors. In addition, there were exciting live presentations and demonstrations from the Skills for Success Stage.

The live stream included approximately 15 hours of competition footage, and the opening and closing ceremonies. Viewers could see the competitors' progress in their project throughout the competition and learn about new careers. Members of the National Technical Committee explained the competition projects, the careers available in their field and what it takes to be successful in their trade or technology.

NEW ELEMENTS AND HIGHLIGHTS

The **DeWalt Tool Enhancement Program** was offered for the 12th consecutive year. Post competition, several high schools and the local Habitat for Humanity in Québec City received Stanley DeWalt tools which were used during the competition. This included a variety of Stanley hand tools and DeWalt power tools and accessories. The DeWalt Tool Enhancement Program has proven to be a legacy for the provinces in which the Skills Canada National Competition (SCNC) is hosted.

The **RBC Best of Region Award** was presented to the individual from each province or territory with the overall highest score using a Z-score calculation formula. They also received a \$1,500 cash award and participated in several media interviews focused on their skills journey.

The 28 official members of **WorldSkills Team Canada 2024** attended SCNC Québec 2024 to cheer on the competitors and witness the competition action. In addition, they continued their training and preparations for the WorldSkills Competition 2024, in Lyon, France, which will be held in September.

This year **UA's Soaring Skills Program** hosted Indigenous students to come experience SCNC. Students explored the various Try-A-Trade® and Technology activities and



learned about careers in the skilled trades and technologies. They also had the opportunity to see the competitors compete in their trade or technology. Check out this **video** featuring the students from the Soaring Skills Program as they participate in several fun activities.



For the second time, Skills/Compétences Canada (SCC) hosted the **Skills Showcase Featuring First Nations, Inuit and Métis Skills**. SCC partnered with First Nations, Inuit, and Métis organizations to host the Skills Showcase at SCNC. This allowed thousands of visitors to explore First Nations, Inuit, and Métis skills and discover how these skills align with several Skill Areas at SCNC. This showcase focused on the intergenerational transfer of many traditional skills such as birch basket and canoe making, storytelling, TV/video production, visual art and textile design from Elders, First Nations, Inuit, and Métis artists and experts, to youth. It demonstrated the links between these skills and potential careers in the skilled trades and technologies.

The **Skills Showcase** artists included:

- **Doreen Stevens** who used storytelling for different display pieces such as: tv/video production (film) on screen, birch baskets and canoes, and canvas/murals. There was also an interactive piece surrounding birch basket and canoe making.
- Charlotte Stevens who displayed several pieces with storytelling including: TV/video production (film) on screen, canvas/murals, and a display of other art pieces. She also performed a hoop dance.







For the second time, SCC held the **Empowering Women in Trades** Initiative at SCNC. This hub was dedicated to showcasing the array of incredible career opportunities available to young women in the skilled trades. Visitors had the opportunity to participate in interactive activities and speak with tradeswomen who love their job to discover what inspired them to pursue their career. Industry celebrity Cynthia Gauthier, Monster Truck Racer and Welder, and industry leaders were onsite to help young women discover the fulfillment that tradeswomen find in their work. In addition, participants could check out the photo booth and take home some fun activities. This initiative was sponsored by Cenovus.





THE SKILLS COMMUNITY COMES TOGETHER

On May 29, Skills/Compétences (SCC) held a Networking Reception for educators, industry leaders, government representatives, SCC alumni and associations. Guests had the opportunity to mix and mingle, and share their skills stories. This event was sponsored by UA Canada. In addition, several attendees gave inspiring speeches to kick off the reception and celebrate the opening of the event. This included the Honourable Minister Boissonault, Minister of Employment, Workforce Development and Official Languages; Dr. Patrick Rouble, President of SCC, Mike Gordon, Director of Canadian Training, UA Canada, and SCC alumna Isabelle Bélanger, WorldSkills Team Canada 2013 competitor in Graphic Design Technology.

The Welcome Reception, held on May 29, was presented by DEWALT and Stanley Tools for the eighth consecutive year. Industry celebrity Cynthia Gauthier, Monster Truck Racer and Welder, kicked off the event with a spirited welcome to the attendees including the competitors, volunteers, and partners. This reception also featured The Hockey Circus Show by Paz, who combined acrobatics, juggling, and one-of-a-kind hockey stunts for the crowd.

On June 1st, SCC hosted the Farewell Brunch with Presenting Sponsors Cenovus Energy and Home Hardware Stores Limited. This was an opportunity to thank all the delegates for coming to the Skills Canada National Competition (SCNC) 2024, in Québec. Several speakers gave a welcome address to the participants including: Shaun Thorson, Chief Executive Officer of SCC, Mario Durocher, Regional Director-Retail Operations for Home Hardware Stores Limited, and Laurie Breton, SCC alumna and WorldSkills Team Canada 2022 competitor in Aerospace Technology.



THE IMPACT OF SCNC



More than 8 in 10 competitors agree that SCNC has improved their adaptability skills (86%) and problem-solving skills (84%).

THE SKILLS FOR SUCCESS ARE IN THE SPOTLIGHT

The Skills for Success (SFS) were highlighted throughout the Skills Canada National Competition (SCNC) 2024, in Québec, with a focus on *Reading*, this year's SFS theme. Several alumni groups were onsite at SCNC Québec 2024 to promote skilled trade and technology careers to youth, our future skilled workforce. They also shared their skills success stories with visitors, and participated in several programs and activities onsite.

The Skills for Success Youth Assembly Discussed the Future of Skills

Held in conjunction with SCNC Québec 2024, the Skills for Success Youth Assembly (SFSYA) provided an opportunity for young adults to discuss Skills/Compétences Canada's (SCC) activities and initiatives. SFSYA gathered recommendations from young Canadians on how to improve SCC's messaging, while discussing important industry issues that directly affect them as they enter the workforce. This year's theme of Reading was integrated into their onsite activities. In addition, SFSYA spent time with the Soaring Skills student group to discuss the Skills Canada National Competition, and also participated in several activities. The SFSYA also toured the competition floor at SCNC and met with visitors to share their journeys.





Reconvened at SCNC 2024

The National Alumni Committee (NAC),

which includes Skills/Compétences Canada alumni from each province and territory, was formed to create, support, and provide guidance to the Skills Canada Alumni Associations across Canada. NAC ensures that the best interests of their alumni member associations are met and that each of their voices are heard. The NAC gathered at SCNC for the fifth time and worked together to establish a consistent message and continue to be a conduit of information for all alumni in their jurisdictions. They also discussed how to engage youth in skilled trade and technology competitions. They were onsite at SCNC to cheer on all the talent and share their success stories. In addition, they supported the SFSYA and Soaring Skills Program, and acted as Team Leaders for their activity. They also provided guided tours of the competition alongside SCC's board members.

Students Learned about the Skills for Success

At SCNC, student visitors had the opportunity to participate in over 50 Try-a-Trade® and Technology activities, to put their skills to the test and get a feel for the trades. They had the chance to complete a variety of trade and technology related projects and bring home products that they created with their own hands. Students were given a Skills for Success passport and encouraged to complete it by identifying the Skills for Success used at various Try-a-Trade® and Technology activities. Submitted passports were eligible to win a prize.

Visitors Tested their Skills on the SFS App

Student visitors had the chance to try out the Skills/ Compétences Canada Mobile App, which was available at the SFS booth. Using this app, they learned about the nine Skills for Success needed for work and life. They could also evaluate and improve their skills, discover over 40 trade and technology career profiles, and check out a directory of trade and technology schools in Canada. 
Skills for Success Forum

- The entire closing ceremony was live streamed and posted on SCC's YouTube channel.



EVENT PROMOTION














































































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
