#CreatingPossibilities for Canada's Future Skilled Workforce at SCNC 2023, in Winnipeg

The Skills Canada National Competition (SCNC) is the only national, multi-trade and technology competition for students and apprentices in the country. During SCNC, Canada's best in skilled trades and technologies compete to become the national champion in their respective discipline. By providing a forum where Canadians can compete at the national level, SCNC provides hands-on work experience related to skilled trade and technology careers. The Skills Canada National Competition 2023 was held in Winnipeg, Manitoba from May 24-27, at the RBC Convention Centre.

HERE ARE SOME OF THE HIGHLIGHTS:

- More than 500 competitors from all regions of Canada participated in 45 skilled trade and technology competitions.
- SCNC 2023 was attended by approximately 13,000 local students and was free and open to the public. SCNC was also attended by stakeholders representing industry, labour, government, education and not-forprofit organizations.



- Visitors had the opportunity to participate in over 50 Try-A-Trade® and Technology activities, giving them a glimpse into skilled trade and technology careers.
- More than 160 partners/sponsors and in-kind suppliers contributed towards this event.
- Over 100 exhibitors demonstrated their brand, trade or occupation through interactive activities.
- The event was held on 280,000 square feet of space.
- Over 4 million dollars' worth of in-kind contributions for material and equipment were used for SCNC.

- The economic impact of SCNC Winnipeg 2023 on the province of Manitoba was over 3.5 million dollars.
- The nine Skills for Success (SFS) were highlighted throughout SCNC and on the Skills for Success Stage, with a special emphasis on Adaptability. Students and guests engaged in interactive activities intended to increase their awareness of the SFS.
- Industry celebrities Kate Campbell, HGTV star and Founder of Kate Builds Inc., Jamie McMillan, Founder of KickAss Careers, and Mark Brand, Social Entrepreneur, were on-site to spread awareness of careers in skilled trades and technologies to youth.
- The official event hashtag **#SCNC2023** was used on SCC's social media channels including Facebook, Twitter and Instagram. There was a total of 667,826 impressions across SCC's social media platforms during the Skills Canada National Competition 2023, in Winnipeg.
- Over a dozen media covered the event including: CBC News, CTV Morning Live, Global News, Radio-Canada, Nunatsiag News, and Hue Productions, to name a few.
- Exclusive networking events were hosted, including the Networking Reception, Farewell Breakfast and competition floor tours.
- Opening and closing ceremonies were professionally produced.

NEW ELEMENTS AND HIGHLIGHTS

• Skills/Compétences Canada (SCC) live streamed SCNC, and the opening and closing ceremonies for the second time. This live stream was sponsored by CBC Radio Canada who also provided two out of the three broadcast hosts. The live stream included competition footage and over 50 onsite interviews with SCC staff,

- partners, alumni, industry celebrities, government representatives, members of the National Technical Committee and the National Board of Directors. The live stream had over 17,500 views and included over 12 hours of competition footage. This year, a total of 21 Skill Areas were featured. The live stream is available on SCC's YouTube channel.
- For the second year, Skills/Compétences Canada (SCC) gave a special award in honour of John Oates, the former President of SCC who sadly passed away in 2021. John served as President, both provincially and nationally, and made a lasting impact on Canadian youth. The John Oates memorial award is given annually at SCNC. The award recipient must demonstrate the kind of volunteer contribution exemplified by John. They will have: a long history of volunteerism; given generously of their time and effort; been a strong advocate of the skills movement; have a firmly established record of selfless commitment; and be seen as a caring and giving individual that others look up to and admire. This prestigious award was presented by Sue Lefort of SCC's National Board of Directors and first recipient of this award and given to John Dalley from Newfoundland and Labrador. John Dalley is the parent of two past competitors, served as a member of the Provincial and National Technical Committees, and eventually became Canadian Expert for WorldSkills. He has made a substantial impact on youth globally.
- The DeWalt Tool Enhancement Program was offered for the 11th consecutive year. Post competition, several high schools and the local Habitat for Humanity in Winnipeg each received Stanley DeWalt tools which were used during the competition. This included a variety of Stanley hand tools and DeWalt power tools. The DeWalt Tool Enhancement Program has proven to be a legacy for the provinces in which SCNC is hosted.
- The Soaring Skills program, held by UA Canada along with the RBC Foundation, First Peoples Development Inc. and SCC, hosted Indigenous students from Northern Manitoba and Nunavut to come experience SCNC. Students explored the various Try-A-Trade® and Technology activities and learned about careers in the skilled trades and technologies. They also had the opportunity to see the competitors compete in their trade or technology. In addition, they stayed at Camp Manitou with support from the True North Youth Foundation, where they participated in several programs and activities such as nature hikes, sports, games, fire building, zipline, archery and fishing.

SKILLS/COMPÉTENCES CANADA

- For the third time, Skills/Compétences Canada hosted a Winner's Circle at the Closing Ceremony. The competition winners posed for an official photo after winning a medal. These were shared on SCC's various social media platforms.
- The RBC Best of Region Awards were presented to the individual from each province or territory with the overall highest score using a Z-score calculation formula. They also received a \$1,500 cash award and participated in several media interviews focused on their skills journey.
- A WorldSkills Team Canada Selection Category took place where the participants competed for a spot on WorldSkills Team Canada 2024. The 28 official members of WorldSkills Team Canada 2024 were announced on July 1st and will compete at the WorldSkills Competition 2024, in Lyon, France.



• For the first time, SCC hosted the Skills Showcase Featuring First Nations, Inuit and Métis Skills. SCC partnered with First Nations, Inuit, and Métis organizations from Manitoba to host the Skills Showcase at SCNC. This showcase allowed thousands of visitors to explore these skills by taking part in interactive activities such as flat stitch beading, soapstone carving, building mini tipis, and constructing Inuit yo-yos. This allowed them the opportunity to see how these skills align with several SCNC Skill Areas such as Fashion Technology and Carpentry and demonstrated the links between these skills and potential careers in the skilled trades and technologies. The Skills Showcase featured six local artists. In addition, SCC held a contest for Manitoba students to determine the logo of the Skills Showcase featuring First Nations, Inuit and Métis Skills, prior

SCC hosted its first ever Skills Symposium at SCNC 2023, in Winnipeg, on May 25 and 26. This event brought together industry, policymakers and educators to discuss and learn more about current issues in the skilled trade and technology sectors. This year's theme was: Embracing Adaptability: Navigating Change in the Skilled Trades and Technologies. The Skills Symposium included many engaging panel discussions and

The Skills Symposium also offered a variety of networking events for participants and a Skills for Success (SFS) Forum focused on Adaptability, this year's SFS theme,

Success for a rewarding career. This keynote address on May 25 was from Mark Brand, pioneering chef and entrepreneur in the field of social impact and community development. He discussed the benefits, challenges and best practices of recruiting and employing workers from diverse backgrounds or with different life experiences to unleash the untapped potential of groups not traditionally participating in the skilled labour force and address the skills shortage our country is currently facing. They discussed successes and innovative approaches in the Canadian Apprenticeship System, current challenges and how training providers and businesses can help meet those challenges. In addition, several of SCC's partners, alumni, board members and staff also participated as speakers.

• For the first time, SCC held the Empowering Women in Trades (EWIT) initiative at SCNC. This booth space was dedicated to showing young women the incredible careers that are available in the skilled trades! Visitors had the opportunity to participate in interactive activities and speak with tradeswomen who love their job to discover what inspired them to pursue their career. In addition, they could try out the virtual welder and chainsaw, gear up and smile at the photo booth, and take home some fun activities. The booth was hosted by several local partners. At the EWIT booth, many inspiring tradeswomen were onsite to share their exciting career journeys. This included: Kate Campbell, TV Personality and Founder of Kate Builds Inc.. Jamie MacMillan, Founder of KickAss Careers, Ethel Anderson, Employment and Training Coordinator at Pinaymootang First Nation, CWB Welding Foundation's Women of Steel™, Sietta Marsden, Valedictorian during the Women's Framing Course, Leah Peters, Site Superintendent for Bockstael, Kristina Peterson, Red Seal Carpenter at Bird Construction, and Ella Morris, an alumna of the Engineering Access Program.

SCNC 2023 SURVEY RESULTS

- **97%** of spectators and competitors would recommend SCNC to others.
- **90%** of spectators had a positive perception of skilled trade and technology careers after SCNC.
- 89% of competitors indicated the prospective career they are considering is in skilled trades and technologies.
- **83%** of competitors believe the competition has increased their chances of getting a job.



Students Engaged in Career Discovery During Let's Talk Careers Competition

Skills/Compétences Canada renewed their partnership with Let's Talk Science and Engineers Canada to engage students in career discovery and exploration. Schools and students across Canada had the chance to learn about careers by participating in the Let's Talk Careers Competition, a 40-day online competition, on the **Chatterhigh** platform.

This competition was held in the Spring and Fall of 2023 and had approximately 10,000 participants from over 300 schools, in more than 150 districts across Canada, who visited over 1,300,000 web pages to explore post-secondary, career, and labour market information. In addition, more than 1,120 students won bursaries.

SKILLS/COMPÉTENCES CANADA

The Let's Talk Careers Competition engaged students across Canada in career discovery by engaging them in exploring existing and emergent careers in skilled trades, technologies and STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics). While participating in this competition, students learned about career and post-secondary options available to them by matching their passions and interests to post-secondary programs or directing them to work options.

Students had the opportunity to answer 10 quiz questions daily, over the course of 40 consecutive days, which allowed them to explore thousands of career options that they may not have known about, and also gave them and their schools the opportunity to win prizes.






Youth Explored Skilled Trade and Technology Careers during NSTTW

This event brought awareness to youth, educators, and career seekers about the many rewarding skilled trade and technology careers that are available across Canada.
- The event included welcome messages from Dr.
 Patrick Rouble, President of SCC and Nick Katalifos,
 Director General of the English Montreal School
 Board. In addition, Cynthia Gauthier, Monster Truck
 Racer and Tommaso Maffei, bronze medalist in
 secondary Cabinetmaking at the Skills Canada National
 Competition 2023, in Winnipeg gave inspiring speeches

- about their career journey into the skilled trades. In addition, Elder Niioieren from the Kanien'kehá:ka nation welcomed everyone to her land.
- The networking breakfast, held in conjunction with the event, had about 75 guests with representatives from education and industry, and SCC alumni.
- Following the official program, more than 300 registered students from local and middle schools participated in 15 Try-A-Trade® and Technology activities held by educators and industry experts. These activities included aesthetics, baking, automobile mechanics, car painting, hairdressing, welding, healthcare, and much more! Throughout the day, students learned about the interesting and important educational pathways and career opportunities in several trade and technology sectors. In addition, the students had a skills passport which they could get stamped after completing the various Try-A-Trade® and Technology activities, for the chance to win a prize.
- In addition, several media outlets covered NSTTW 2023 including the National Post, Global News and Canadian Contractor. SCC also had over 550,000





impressions on its social media channels during NSTTW. In addition, Skills/Compétences Canada (SCC) held a pan-canadian digital campaign on social media, which reached 768,449 people and had 27,877 clicks.

Furthermore, during NSTTW 2023, Dr. Patrick Rouble, President of Skills/Compétences Canada (SCC), Mr. Shaun Thorson, Chief Executive Officer of SCC, along with three skills champions met with The Honorable Randy Boissonnault, Minister of Employment, Workforce Development and Official Languages, and Irek Kusmierczyk, Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Employment, Workforce Development and Official Languages. They celebrated the 19th National Skilled Trade and Technology Week on Parliament Hill, in Ottawa. The three Skills champions included

Following the Skills Canada National Competition (SCNC) 2023, in Winnipeg, the highest ranking, age eligible participant in each identified Skill Area, was selected to participate in the next WorldSkills Competition. WorldSkills Team Canada (WSTC) 2024 met for the first time in the Fall, where they began preparations for the 47th WorldSkills Competition. These competitors participated in various training activities and a mental preparation program over the next year.

WSTC 2024 will participate at WorldSkills Lyon 2024 against competitors from around the globe. These competitors represent the best of their peers and have earned a spot on their country's team through their dedication and hard work. At WorldSkills Lyon 2024, approximately 1,400 competitors from 70 Member countries and regions will compete in 59 Skill Areas for the title of world champion in their respective trade or technology. The 47th WorldSkills Competition will take place at Eurexpo Lyon, in front of approximately 250,000 spectators. This four-day WorldSkills Competition is the biggest of its kind in the world and is considered the pinnacle of excellence in skilled trades and technologies. The theme of the 47th WorldSkills Competition is: **Where there is a skill there is a way**.

While SCC recognizes that there is more work to be done, it is our hope that we are well on our way to true diversity, equity and inclusion.

SKILLS FOR SUCCESS

Skills for Success Day took place on Thursday, September 23, 2023. SCC celebrated this day to bring attention to the Skills for Success (SFS) and their importance in skilled trade and technology careers. SFS also took center stage at our National Skilled Trade and Technology Week event, which took place in Montréal, QC. At this launch event, we introduced the SFS theme for the year, *Adaptability*, and highlighted how this skill is used in various trade and technology careers. SCC also launched a series of SFS Kahoot! Challenges to introduce students to the nine Skills for Success and help them learn about different careers paths while having fun!

The Skills for Success (SFS) were highlighted in several activities at the Skills Canada National Competition 2023, in Winnipeg, with a focus on Adaptability, this year's SFS theme. Students were given a Skills for Success passport and encouraged to complete it by identifying the Skills for Success used at various Try-a-Trade® and Technology activities. Submitted passports were eligible to win a prize.

THE SKILLS FOR SUCCESS YOUTH ASSEMBLY DISCUSSED THE FUTURE OF SKILLS

Held in conjunction with SCNC Winnipeg 2023, the **Skills for Success Youth Assembly (SFSYA)** provided an opportunity for young adults to discuss Skills/Compétences Canada's (SCC) activities and initiatives. SFSYA gathered recommendations from young Canadians on how to improve SCC's messaging, while discussing important industry issues that directly affect

them as they enter the workforce. This year's theme of *Adaptability* was integrated into their onsite activities. In addition, SFSYA spent time with the Soaring Skills student group to discuss the Skills Canada National Competition, and also participated in several activities. The SFSYA also toured the competition floor at SCNC and met with visitors to share their journeys.

The National Alumni Committee (NAC), which includes Skills/Compétences Canada alumni from each province and territory, was formed to create, support, and provide guidance to the Skills Canada Alumni Associations across Canada. The NAC gathered at SCNC for the fifth time and worked together to establish a consistent message and continue to be a conduit of information for all alumni in their jurisdictions. They also discussed how to engage youth in skilled trade and technology competitions. They were onsite at SCNC to cheer on all the talent and share their success stories. In addition, they supported the SFSYA and Soaring Skills Program, and acted as Team Leaders for their activity. They also provided guided tours of the competition alongside SCC's board members. In addition, NAC participated in a leadership training in Kemptville, Ontario giving back to the community by contributing to a Habitat for Humanity Greater Ottawa build. Anthony Minotti, Shares his Skills Story

My career goal is to open my own shop in the future.


